Methodological training and skill

During my time in academic research, I have acquired hands-on experience in conducting semi- and non-structured interviews (stakeholders, elites), longitudinal ethnographic case studies, observing electronic communication, online and offline activities and electronically mediated work (participant observation / comprehension and studies in ethnomethodology). I have used analytic tools for qualitative data and I analyse documents and records applying methods such as discourse, content, rhetorical and conversation analysis. I have also done audiovisual analysis. In 2005, I was awarded a Master of Science degree in *Social Science Research Methods* from Cardiff University which prepared me to apply many of the qualitative methods I have since used, for example, interviews, longitudinal observation (on-site/virtual), use of documents, records and CAQDAS, plus training in survey design and the use of SPSS for statistical analyses of survey and other quantitative data. Prior to that, I acquired hands-on experience with action research, convening focus groups and expert consultation workshops, structured around practical work-based (problem-solving) aims and objectives. In addition to this, I have attended a range of courses as part of my professional development at Lancaster University since 2010, including on how to succeed as a researcher, on leadership qualities and pitfalls, on writing funding proposals and managing research projects.
